## JOPLIN COMMUNITY

Joplin is located in southwest Missouri in the "four states" region encompassing Oklahoma, Kansas, Missouri and Arkansas. At the edge of the Ozark Mountain region, Joplin has a current population of 49,024. The daytime population swells to 270,000 while the population within a 40-mile radius of Joplin is 400,000, making it Missouri's fourth largest metropolitan area. Joplin combines the beauty and hospitality of country living, with the convenience and commerce of city vitality.

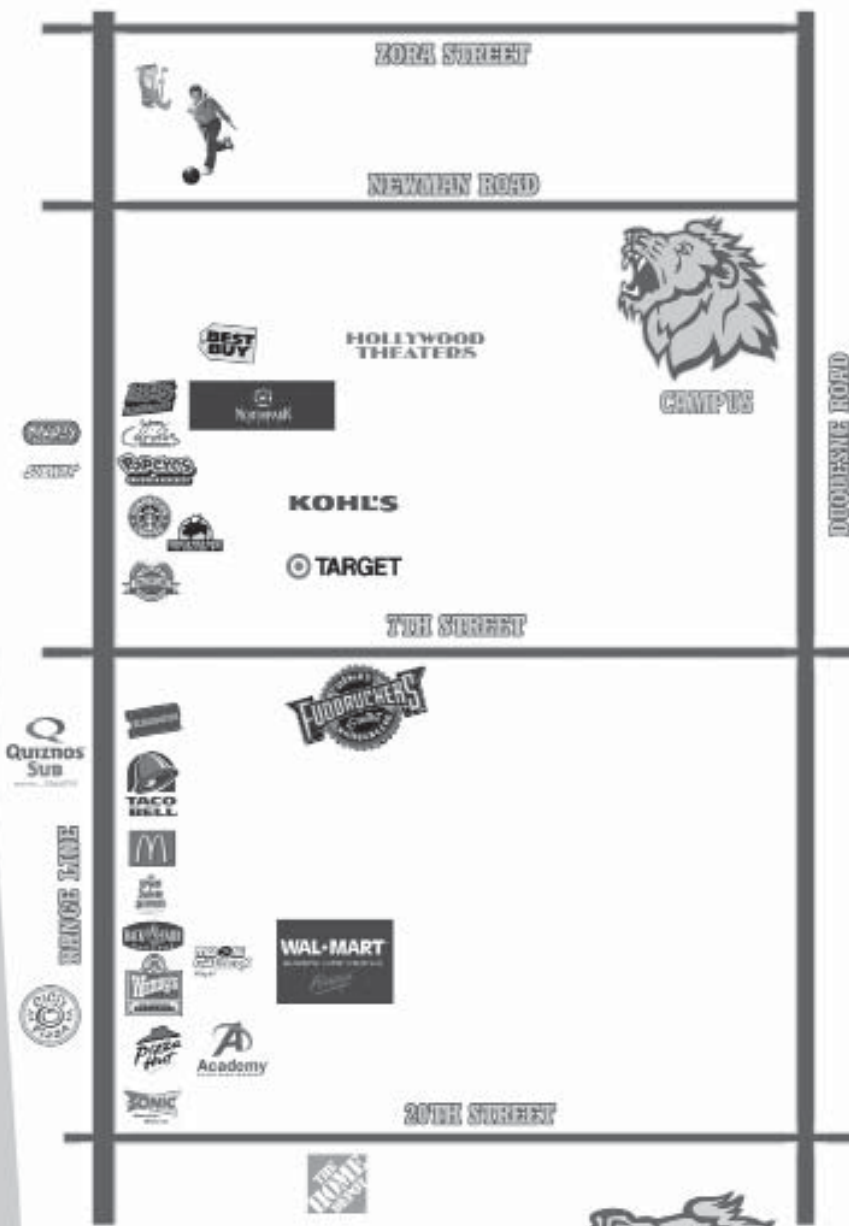

# ***Dr. Bruce W. Speck, President***

Dr. Bruce Speck was named the fourth president in the history of Missouri Southern State University on January 18, 2008. He previously served as Provost and Vice President for Academic and Student Affairs at Austin Peay State University (APSU) in Clarksville, Tenn., one of six universities in the Tennessee Board of Regents System. In that position, Speck was involved with financial management, fundraising and grant development, hiring, mentoring and evaluating faculty and served as "chief guardian of academic integrity."

From 2001-2005, Speck served as Vice President for Academic Affairs and tenured Professor of English.

Before joining APSU, Speck served at the University of North Carolina at Pembroke as the Associate Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs and Professor of English and Interim Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences (1999-2000) and Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences and Professor of English (2000-2001).

Prior to that, Speck was at the University of Memphis in the capacity of Assistant Professor (1990-1993), Associate Professor, Department of English, and Coordinator, Writing-Across-the-Curriculum program (1993-1997), Professor, Department of English and Coordinator, Writing-Across-the-Curriculum program (1997-1999), and Acting Director, Center for Academic Excellence (1997-1999).

Speck has also served at Indiana University Purdue University at Fort Wayne as an assistant professor, where he was hired to develop a master's program in technical writing (1987-1990).

His industry experience includes being a science writer at Norden Laboratories in Lincoln, Nebraska (1984-1986) and an associate at Kamterter, Inc. in Lincoln.

Speck's academic credentials include a Ph.D. in English with emphasis in Rhetoric and Composition, University of Nebraska-Lincoln (1980-1984), an M.A.E. in English, Wayne State College in Nebraska (1978-1980), and a B.A. in English, University of Northern Colorado (1973-1975).

Speck is the author of numerous book monographs, book chapters, annotated bibliographies and journal articles. One of his most recent monographs, co-authored with Jordy Rocheleau, is Rights and Wrongs in the College Classroom: Ethical Issues in Postsecondary Teaching.

Dr. Speck and his wife, Carmen, have three grown children, Heidi, Ryan and Rose-Marie.

## **Sallie Beard** **Athletics Director**

Now in her 37th year at her alma mater, Sallie Beard is in her seventh year as Missouri Southern's athletics director. For 25 years prior to the 2001-02 academic year, Beard helped lead the growth and development of Missouri Southern's women's athletics program, as she served as MSSU's women's athletics director.

Since beginning as the school's sole athletics director, Beard has played an integral role in several projects. During the 2002-03 academic year, she oversaw the Lion Pride Restoration Project, an effort to replace track and artificial football playing surfaces at Missouri Southern's Fred G. Hughes Stadium. Beard also led the effort to split the MSSU soccer programs. The men's and women's teams had previously operated under one head coach until 2003. More recently, Southern has announced plans on developing the 110 acres of land East of Duquesne Road for use by six varsity sports, which will include improvements to Fred Hughes Stadium.

Beard currently serves on the NCAA Division II Management Council, the Management Council Identity Subcommittee and the NCAA Convention Planning Subcommittee. She has previously served on the Division II Nominating and Voting Committees, the Division II Student-Athlete Reinstatement Committee, as well as the Committee on Women's Athletics. Beard has held a leading role in the MIAA, serving as the conference's president from 1999 until 2001. She filled the position after serving as vice president of the MIAA in the 1998-99 school year.

Since serving as the first head coach of the women's basketball, softball, track and field and tennis teams, Beard has seen the department grow in both size and stature as Southern now offers eight women's varsity sports and has attained NCAA Division II status and membership in the MIAA. During her tenure, the Southern women have won four conference basketball championships, four softball titles, two cross country titles, and one conference crown each in volleyball, tennis and track & field.

Beard served as tournament director for the 1992 and 1993 NCAA Division

II Softball Championships. Southern won the Championship in 1992. This past year, the Missouri Southern athletic program finished 46th nationally in the Division II Directors' Cup Standings. Nine of the 16 programs advanced to NCAA post season play in 2006-07 and Missouri Southern will also serve as the host for the 2007 NCAA Division II Men's and Women's Cross Country Championships.

Always taking pride in the academic success the program has consistently shown, Missouri Southern ranks among the best in the MIAA. The conference and the NCAA chart the academic success rates (ASR) of member institutions over a six-year period. They take into count two separate rates, one for scholarship athletes, and another for all athletes. This past period, under Beard's leadership, Missouri Southern had an ASR of 87 percent, which is 36 percent higher than the general population at MSSU, and the highest differential within the MIAA.

A native of Joplin, Beard earned her bachelor's degree in physical education from Southern in 1972. She was hired as an instructor in the University's physical education department in August of that year.

After earning a master's degree in physical education from Pittsburg State University in 1973, Beard was called upon by several students in 1974 to organize Southern's first women's basketball, softball and tennis teams. She coached all three sports until 1976, when she relinquished her softball duties to become women's athletics director and head coach of the first MSSU women's track & field team. She later stepped down as basketball coach in 1977 and as tennis coach in 1978.

During her stint as track & field coach, Beard was twice named NAIA District 16 Coach of the Year, including in 1983 when she led Southern to the district outdoor title. She also served as an assistant coach for the U.S. team at the 1981 World University Games in Romania and for the North squad at the 1983 National Sports Festival in Colorado Springs, Colo. She was also on the games committees for the NAIA Indoor and Outdoor Track & Field Championships from 1979-83.

Beard and her husband, Larry, have two children, a daughter, Meghan Klosterman, and a son, Andrew. Andrew is a graduate of the University of Tulsa and is a system analyst with Sigma Inc. in Denver. Meghan and her



## **Robert Corn** **Assistant Athletics Director - Special Projects**

With the restructuring of the Missouri Southern athletic department management team in 2001, the position of Assistant Athletic Director was created.

But even though the position was new, the man selected to assume that role — Robert Corn — was no stranger to Missouri Southern athletics. Corn, the Lions head basketball coach for the

past 19 years, is also responsible for alumni relations, development, and game management in his role as assistant athletics director for special projects.

No one is more familiar with Southern or the Joplin community than the Lions' basketball mentor. Few have been as successful on the hardwood, either. Corn has led the Lions to ten straight Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association Postseason Tournament berths, 14 total, and two trips to the NCAA Division II Tournament.

The 1999-2000 Division II Bulletin National Coach of the Year holds a career record of 280-246 (.548) at Southern, and has produced six

20-win seasons, highlighted by a 30-3 campaign in 1999-2000. That squad won the MIAA Regular Season and Postseason Tournament Championships, the South Central Regional title, and advanced to the NCAA Division II Elite Eight semifinals. The winningest men's basketball coach in Missouri Southern history, he led the Lions to four consecutive 20-win campaigns from 1999-2003.

A native of Benton, Ill., where he was twice a special mention prep All-Stater, Corn played basketball for two seasons at Memphis State University (now the University of Memphis), before transferring to Missouri Southern. As a senior, he was co-captain of the 1977-78 squad that went 27-9 to capture both the Central States Intercollegiate Conference and National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics District 16 crowns, and advanced to the quarterfinals of the NAIA Tournament.

Southern's Outstanding Physical Education Major as a senior, he received his bachelor's degree in 1978, and went on to earn a master's degree in physical education in 1981 from the Alabama-Birmingham. Corn has just recently been named to serve on the NCAA Basketball Rules Committee.

Corn, who is also an instructor of kinesiology, is married to the former Cindy Little of Muscle Shoals, Ala. They have two sons, Rob

This past year the team hosted the Division II Super Regional at Twin Hills Golf and Country Club and finished second in the Central Region. Senior Tommy Clifford was an All-Conference selection and freshman Adam Nelson was second in the tournament.

A graduate of Southwest Missouri State University with a bachelor's degree in electronic media, Greim received his master's degree in health, physical education and recreation from Delta State (Miss.) University.

Greim's broadcast background includes radio play-by-play of Delta State football, basketball and baseball. He also produced and hosted the DSU Sports Show and maintained advertising sales for both radio and television.

He also served as a sports announcer for WSLI-AM 930 radio in Jackson, Miss., where he provided play-by-play and color commentary for area high school and college sports and served as co-host of a daily sports talk show.

A native of Excelsior Springs, Mo., Greim and his wife, the former Sarah Yates, live in Carl Junction.



## Julie Wengert

### Assistant AD - Compliance

Julie Wengert was named Compliance Coordinator at Missouri Southern in January of 2003 and was just recently named Assistant Athletics Director for Compliance. A former standout for the Lions tennis team, she served from August 2001 until March 2003 as the squad's head coach.

A native of Parsons, Kan., Wengert had a stellar career for the Southern tennis team, lettering at No. 1 and No. 2 singles and at No. 1 doubles all four years. She was a three-time Academic All-MIAA and MIAA Commissioner's Academic Honor Roll selection. Wengert won back-to-back No. 1 doubles championships in the conference tournament as a sophomore and a junior and was an integral part of the Lions' MIAA championship run her sophomore year.

Wengert graduated magna cum laude from MSSU in May 2001 with a degree in elementary education. She earned her masters in Athletics Administration from William Woods University in 2007. Formerly Julie Posch, she is married to former Lion baseball player Jonathan Wengert and the couple welcomed their first child, Jocelyn, in March of 2007.

### Head Athletic Trainer

# Strength & Conditioning



The Missouri Southern Strength and Conditioning Performance Center is a 3,480 square foot facility offering student-athletes the opportunity to train in one of the finest NCAA Division II strength facilities. The facility consists of 12 tanning racks, six weightlifting platforms, a full line of dumbbells, 16 upper and lower body weight machines and a variety of cardiovascular equipment.

Training occurs in a variety of modalities, including combinations of free weights, selectorized machines, and dumbbells. Student-athletes have their choice of cardiovascular equipment, including upright bikes, stair climbers, treadmills, and slide boards. Reaction balls, step hurdles, timing devices, and medicine balls are a few examples of the numerous training aids providing student-athletes the opportunity to enhance their skill-related components such as speed, coordination, reaction time, and agility. The state-of-the-art equipment was custom developed in conjunction with such companies as Quantum Fitness, O.E.I., Hammer Strength, SciFit, and Cybex.

In Troy Jorgensen, Southern also has the only full-time strength and conditioning coach in the MIAA. Missouri Southern has emerged as the standard in NCAA Division II as to which other programs are compared in terms of resistance training facilities.

Each Missouri Southern student-athlete will receive individual attention from the strength and conditioning staff as well as individualized workouts for their respective sport. The strength and conditioning staff is also responsible for the speed, agility and conditioning development of each team.

**Coach Troy Jorgensen**

Troy Jorgensen begins his third year as director of the Missouri Southern strength and conditioning program. Prior to Southern, Jorgensen spent four years as an assistant strength and conditioning coach at the University of California at Los Angeles (UCLA).

Jorgensen worked directly with football, softball, women's swimming, gymnastics, men's soccer and men's basketball. During his tenure, UCLA won ten NCAA National Championships, went to four bowl games, the Softball World Series, and the Final Four.

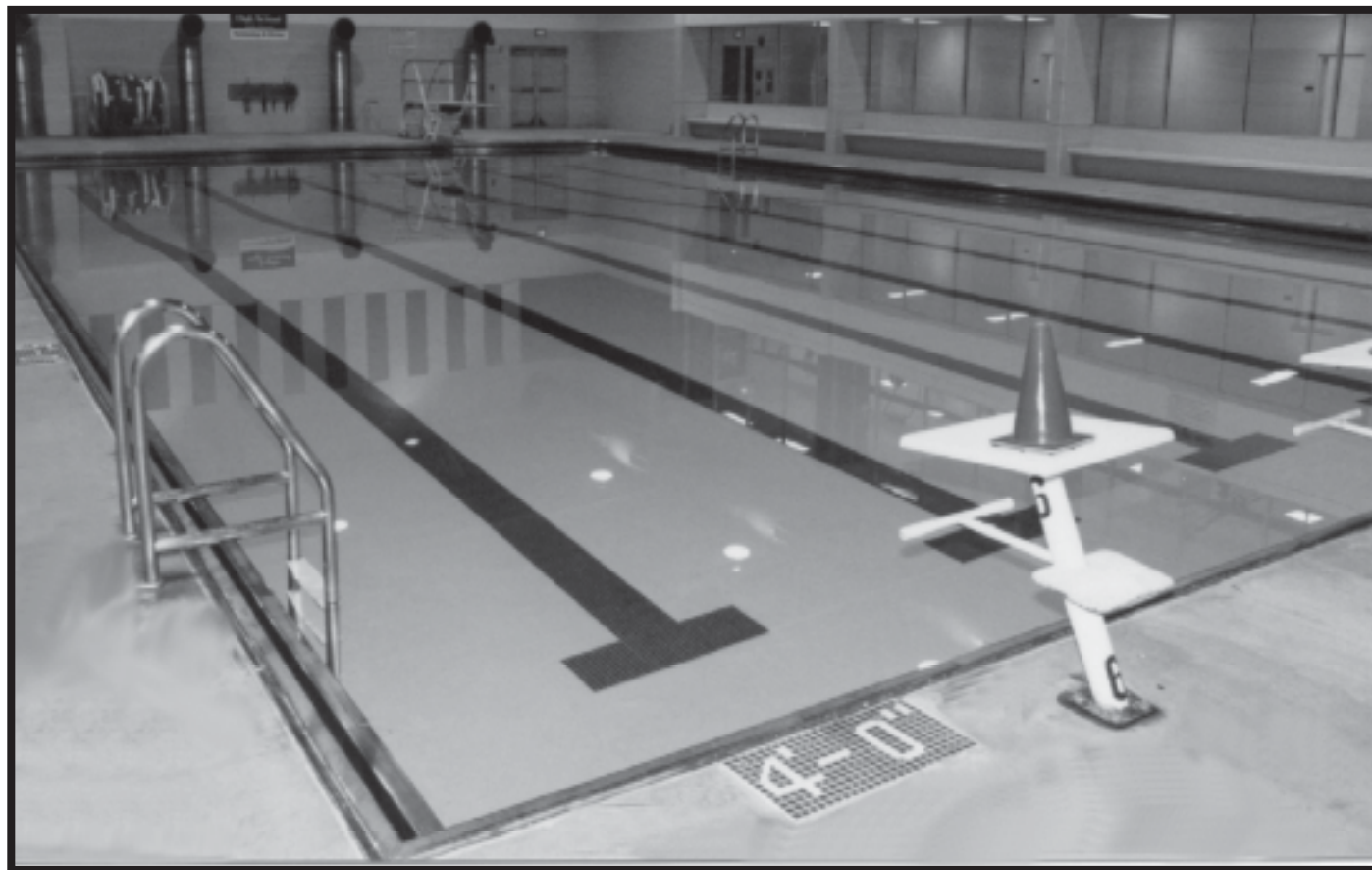
Prior to UCLA, Jorgensen spent three years at Utah State as the assistant strength and conditioning coach. He was responsible for softball, women's soccer, gymnastics, track and field, tennis and assisted with football and men's basketball.

Jorgensen is certified by the Collegiate Strength and Conditioning Coaches Association and the National Strength and Conditioning Association. He graduated from Missouri Western with a BS in exercise science, where he was also a four year letter winner in football. He also earned a master's in exercise science from Utah State University.

# Missouri Southern Athletics



## ***In Search of Excellence***

It's exciting to be a part of Missouri Southern athletics, both as a participant and as a fan. The Missouri Southern Lions have been Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association Champions in football, men's and women's cross country, men's soccer, men's and women's basketball, baseball, softball, and tennis. The football team has been a winner, claiming the NAIA Division II National Championship in 1972 and the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association title in 1993. The Lions currently have three players on NFL rosters and two playing minor league baseball.

The Lions softball team is a frequent participant in regional action, and in 1992 won the NCAA Division II National Championship. The men's basketball team hosted and won the NCAA Division II South Central Regional Tournament and advanced to the Division II Final Four in 2000, while the baseball team has made numerous trips to the College World Series, finishing second in the nation in 1991. Both MSSU men and women have had national champions in track.

In all, Missouri Southern has claimed 37 conference crowns, including 26 since joining the MIAA.

## ***Quality Athletes***

Each year Missouri Southern student-athletes are recognized by coaches around the conference as All-MIAA performers, while several also are named to All-America teams. MSSU men and women have been named MIAA Most Valuable Player, Rookie of the Year and Ken B. Jones Award winners (for outstanding student-athlete in the conference), and have also been National Player of the Year honorees, as well as finalists for national awards such as the Harlon Hill Trophy in football.

In 2007, both the MSSU men's and women's cross country squads won MIAA titles for the second year in a row, with the women's program claiming the MIAA's Triple Crown, winning cross country, as well as Indoor and Outdoor Track and Field titles. The men's cross country championship was the seventh in the last eight seasons for the program. During the 2004 season, both the men's and women's track and field teams claimed MIAA Indoor Titles, the first in school history. The Southern softball team has appeared in 16 of the last 18 MIAA post season tournaments. Men's basketball has earned nine straight berths in the league tournament and is 145-93 over the last seven seasons. Women's basketball has gone to the last seven conference tourneys in a row and in 2004 had it's best season since 1996. The golf team has twice knocked on the door for the MIAA title, finishing second in the yearly standings and finished fourth in the NCAA Central Super Regional last season. The athletic program, as a whole, finished 32nd in Division II in the 2007-08 Director's Cup Standings.

## ***Solid Students***

Of course the primary goal of any institution of higher education is to graduate its students. At Missouri Southern that philosophy is no different. Student-athletes wearing the Green & Gold also get the job done in the classroom. In the 1990s, the Lions boasted a graduation rate of 77.3 percent. MSSU student-athletes also have maintained cumulative team grade-point averages above the 3.0 mark. In fact, the entire Missouri Southern Athletic Department GPA for the spring of 2006 was 3.07. For their efforts, Southern's student-athletes are routinely named to the MIAA Commissioner's Honor Roll teams, as well as the Academic All-MIAA, Presidential Scholar Athlete, and Academic All-District and All-America squads. In all, more than 50 Lions have been named Academic All-America.

## ***Contributors in the Community***

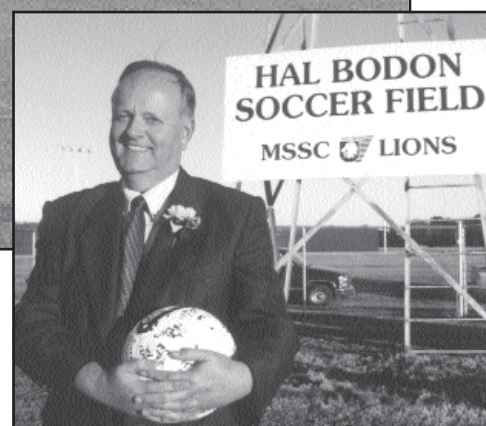
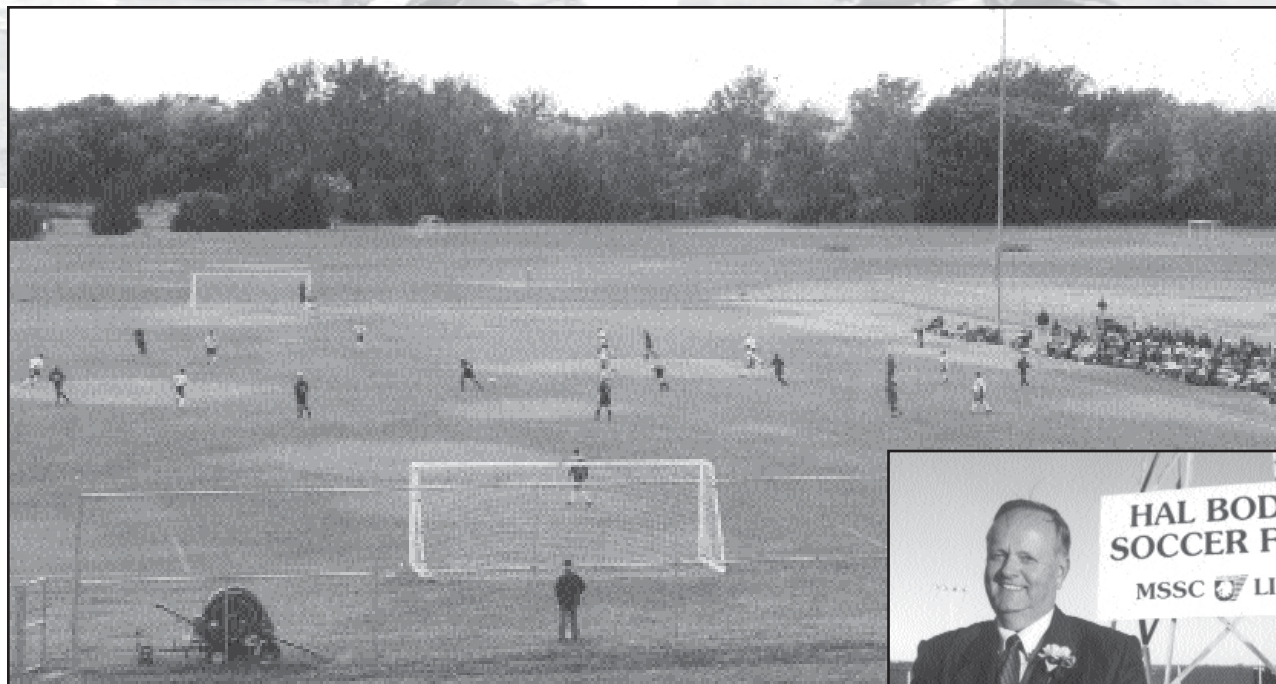
Not only do they perform on the field and in the classroom, but Missouri Southern's Lions are also involved in the Joplin community. They work with such organizations as the Special Olympics, the Ronald McDonald House, the Boy's and Girl's Club, Adopt-A-Street, and the Children's Miracle Network, and are frequently contacted by schools in the area with requests for special visits. Missouri Southern's student-athletes are frequently invited to serve as hosts and guest speakers for special events in Joplin and the surrounding communities.

## ***Outstanding Facilities***

Of course, to be competitive, teams need quality facilities. Missouri Southern has those. The Leggett & Platt Athletic Center, constructed in 1999 with seating for more than 3,200, contains three gymnasiums, an indoor competition track, an incredible weight room and state-of-the-art sports rehabilitation facilities. In addition, Robert Ellis Young Gymnasium includes courts for basketball, racquetball and volleyball, and a six-lane swimming pool. The surfaces for football and outdoor track & field at Fred G. Hughes Stadium underwent a major renovation in 2003. The football field was given a new, top-of-the-line artificial playing surface and the all-weather track was equipped with a new all-weather surface, upgrading it to a national meet-caliber facility. Other outdoor facilities include lighted tennis courts, several soccer fields, two softball fields and one of the finest cross country courses in the nation. The course hosted regional meets in 1999, 2001 and 2004, 2007, and the 1999 and 2007 NCAA Division II Championships.

## Hal Bodon Field: Home of Southern Soccer

When Dr. Hal Bodon first introduced soccer at Missouri Southern State College in 1972, he started with phone poles and chicken wires.

Now the Missouri Southern soccer field is freshly adorned with a scoreboard, sound system, lights, and a chain link fence, thus making it an attractive and picturesque venue from which to watch exciting soccer action.

Fittingly, the powers that be at Missouri Southern decided to honor the founder of Missouri Southern soccer, as Missouri Southern's home pitch was dedicated "Dr. Harold 'Hal' Bodon Field" on September 9, 1998.

The Lions downed Bartlesville Wesleyan College 1-0 their first night on the field officially named for the individual who brought soccer to Missouri Southern. Since 1984, Southern's men have posted an 93-82-21 record on their home pitch for a .528 winning percentage.

Bodon, served as a professor of communications for 25 years at Missouri Southern, in addition to his position as head soccer coach. He posted a career record of 139-73-22 from 1976-87, good for a .641 winning percentage. He retired from Missouri Southern in the spring of 1996 and went on to serve as a missionary in Port-au-Prince, Haiti with the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints.

## Kiley Cirillo Head Men's Soccer Coach

In 2003, the former Missouri Southern team captain and four-year starter returned to action for the Lions, but instead as the squad's seventh head coach in team history.

Cirillo now enters his sixth year as head men's soccer coach at MSSU.

Last season, the Lions posted their second-highest win total since 2003 that included a two-game winning streak to begin the season.

The Lions went 3-11-4 in 2006 but managed to knock off 2005 NCAA Tournament qualifier Truman in dramatic fashion with a 1-0 overtime win on a penalty kick.

In 2005, the Lions more than doubled their win total from the previous season by finishing 5-14 overall and 3-11 in the SSC. Cirillo also led the Lions to a couple of marquee victories last year, featuring wins over No. 20-ranked Rockhurst (1-0, Sept. 3) and then SSC-leader West Texas A&M (3-0, Oct. 23).

Cirillo's first MSSU squad finished 5-11 in 2003, but the team seemed to come on strong as the season progressed. The Lions played .500 soccer over their last 10 matches, improving leading up to the 2004 campaign.

In 2004, Southern returned to a conference for the first time since 1998 in the fledgling Southwest Soccer Conference (SSC), made up of teams from Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Missouri. The league quickly became known as one of the most powerful in NCAA Division II. The Lions went 2-14-3 overall in '04, finishing 1-11-2 in the SSC. Southern did post a tie vs. conference and national power Incarnate Word (Texas) and collected a road win against Eastern New Mexico.

A native of Springfield, Mo. and a graduate of Springfield's Kickapoo High School, Cirillo previously worked as Director of Coaching/Director of Club for the Springfield Premier Soccer Club. There, he was responsible for the development of approximately 350 youth soccer players and served as head coach of the under-16 boys and girls teams, the under-18 girls team and the under-13 girls squad. He also was responsible for the placement and resume-building of college-bound student-athletes, planning and organizing coaches meetings, coach evaluations and daily club operations.

Cirillo is married to the former Nicole Shoger, who serves as an assistant coach on the MSSU Volleyball squad. The couple have a son, Kale.



## Brett Kohler Assistant Men's Soccer Coach

Brett Kohler is in his first year as an assistant coach on the MSSU men's soccer staff after a three-year playing career for the Lions. Kohler saw action in 41 matches during his

time at Southern and scored two goals. He also earned a spot on the 2006 SSC Commissioner's Academic Honor Roll.

Kohler was a four-year letterman and a two-year starter

in soccer for the Gibault Catholic Hawks of coach Jim Corsi. He was selected to the 2003 IHSA all-sectional team and was also named to the Illinois Mid-State Elite Eight All-Classic Tournament Team. Kohler helped the Hawks to three consecutive sectional titles, including a third-place state finish in 2002 and a fourth-place showing in 2003.

# 2008 Preview

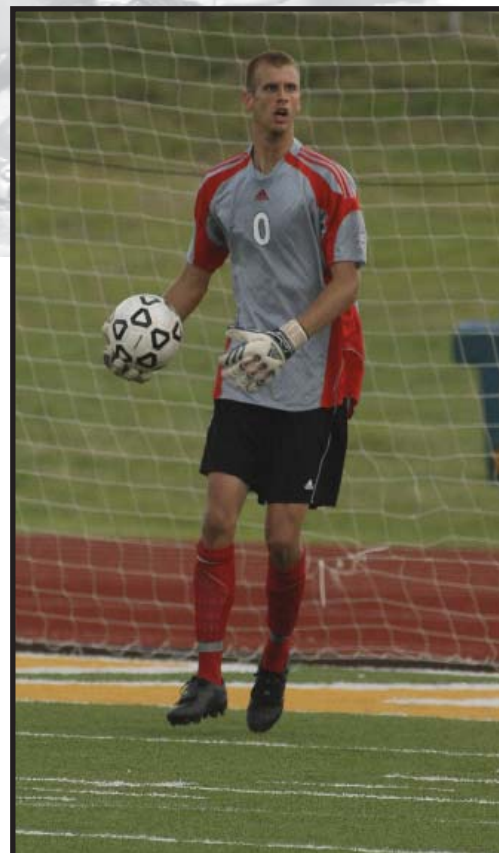
Armed with 11 newcomers in a sparkling recruiting class, the Missouri Southern Lions will look to improve on a 4-10-2 campaign in 2007. The class is regarded as arguably the best in head coach Kiley Cirillo's tenure and will serve as important building blocks for the program's future. "Our freshman class is one of the most athletic groups we have ever had on campus," Cirillo said. "They will make immediate impacts." But Cirillo also raves about the core group of veterans that will show the way for the underclassmen. "We have a great group of returners and our two seniors have really been through a lot and are looking to really leave their mark as they move on from this program," Cirillo said. If the Lions performance in the preseason is any indication, the squad will show vast improvement in the upcoming season. "We are coming off a great spring and it looks as if we are riding the success into this season," Cirillo said. "We've had a great preseason and everyone came in fit, including the freshmen."

## Goalkeepers

Junior Jon Hansen (Wichita, Kan.) will be in the net for the Lions once again this season after playing every minute last season. Hansen showed solid potential in his first season at goal with a 1.76 goals-against-average and 87 saves. Hansen currently owns the fourth-best GAA in MSSU history at 1.69. Freshman Daniel Cairo (Loveland, Colo.) will provide depth behind Hansen.

## Midfielders

Senior Austin Whiles (Overland Park, Kan.) will lead the way on the midfield for the Lions. Whiles started every match last year and was second on the team with two goals and tied for second with a pair of assists. Juniors Mike Bayless (Lansing, Kan.), Jesse Clevenger (Webb City, Mo.) and Ben Pantzlaff (Omaha, Neb.) also return to provide more veteran leadership at the midfield. Bayless led the Lions with three assists last season and tallied the game-winning goal in the Lions' season-opening win over Delta State (8/24/07). Pantzlaff also scored a game-winner in a 3-0 victory over Harding in the second match of the season (8/26/07). Clevenger started

playing time after playing in 11 matches last year and scoring the game-winning goal at Newman (9/29/07). Parker played in 12 matches and started twice, while Boucher appeared in seven outings with two starts. Four freshmen that will vie for playing time at the midfield spot include Jordan Roach (Kansas City, Mo.), Greg Edmonds (Tulsa, Okla.), Sam Braverman (Sedalia, Mo.) and Ryan Whiles (Overland Park, Kan.)

## Forwards

This position looks to be the most inexperienced spot on the roster, so solid contributions will be expected immediately from the newcomers. Only sophomore Trent Baker (Oklahoma City, Okla.) and Richie Knight (Independence, Mo.) have playing experience as a forward. Baker made six starts in 15 outings and scored once. Knight saw action in 11 matches with a pair of starts. A host of newcomers that will look to make positive impacts are Stuart Ziegler (West Plains, Mo.), Kevin Aubuchon (St. Louis, Mo.), Lawrence Lartey (Lee's Summit, Mo.) and Ryan Mabry (Independence, Mo.).

## Defenders

Junior Tony Simmons

(Oklahoma City, Okla.) returns to anchor the back for the Lions after playing and starting 15 matches last year. Also returning for his senior season is Aaron Rippelmeyer (Waterloo, Ill.), who played in four matches in 2007 and started once. Redshirt freshman Nate Evans (Eagle Rock, Mo.) and freshmen Corey Bryant (Lebanon, Mo.) will also push for playing time.

## Schedule

The Lions' schedule looks to be especially challenging, with three opponents currently ranked in the NSCAA Preseason Top-25 poll. The Lions will kick off the 2008 campaign in Tahlequah, Okla., with matches against Texas A&M International on Aug. 29 and Truman on Aug. 31. The Lions will make another trip to Tahlequah on Sept. 10 to open up Southwest Soccer Conference action against Northeastern State. The always daunting SSC schedule also features home and away dates against No. 3 Midwestern State and No. 12-ranked West Texas A&M. The Lions will also host No. 22-ranked Rockhurst in a non-conference matchup on Sept. 12. Cirillo says the Lions'

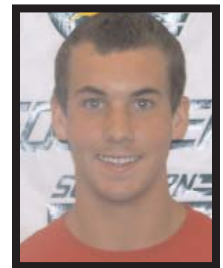

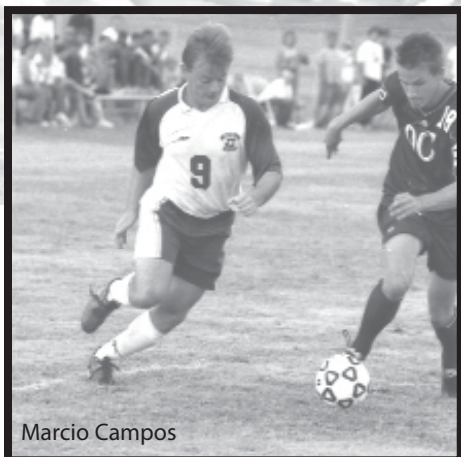

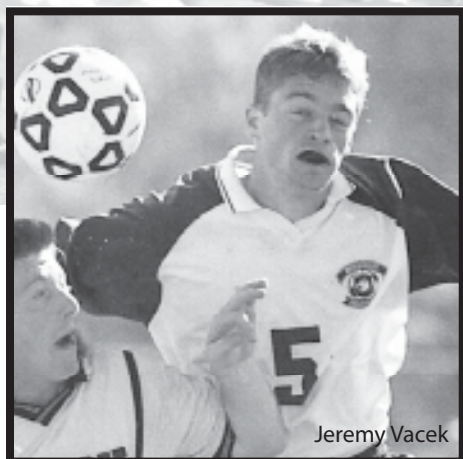

# The NCAA

Over the last few years, the NCAA and its member colleges and universities have worked hard to emphasize the student in the term student-athlete. Academic standards and rules have been developed and changed to ensure that student-athletes can excel in the classroom as they do in their sports. The result of these reforms has been that student-athletes are more likely than ever before to succeed in the collegiate environment.

The CHAMPS/Life Skills program was developed by the NCAA to help prepare student-athletes for the challenges of life beyond the playing field. The focus of the program is on commitments viewed as critical to personal growth: academic excellence, personal development, service, and career development. In addition, NCAA schools work hard to offer further academic support programs to help student-athletes prosper. These programs offer access to study facilities and tutors as well as monitor student-athlete progress.

One result of these programs is that NCAA Division I student-athletes have been consistently graduating at a rate higher than the rest of the student body. For the class entering college in 1989, 57 percent of the overall student body at NCAA Division I institutions graduated, while Division I student-athletes graduated at a rate of 58 percent. The rate does not include student-athletes who transfer to and graduate from other institutions.

Minimum academic requirements that student-athletes must meet to play sports as freshmen in college are one reason for the higher graduation rates. In 1982, a group of college presidents, sponsored by the American Council on Education, proposed a set of minimum academic standards to determine freshman athletics eligibility. The first set of standards was implemented in 1986. They required that freshmen graduate high school with a minimum grade-point average of 2.000 in 11 core academic courses and a minimum standardized test score of 700 on the SAT or 15 on the ACT to be eligible to play sports and receive an athletics scholarship.

Two years ago, the number of required core academic courses was raised to 13 and last fall, a grade-point average and test-score sliding index went into effect. This scale allows student-athletes with higher grades to qualify with lower test scores, and vice versa.

Any high school student who is interested in playing sports at the NCAA Division I or II level should learn about the standards as early as possible. In addition, high school student-athletes should talk to their guidance counselors and coaches to learn more.

High school students can also call the NCAA Eligibility Hotline, 1-800-638-3731. This number features recordings with information on a number of freshman eligibility topics, including accommodations for students with learning disabilities. Students can also order a free copy of the "Guide for the College-Bound Student-Athlete" by calling the hotline and following the prompts.

The NCAA's Initial-Eligibility Clearinghouse ensures that student-athletes have met the academic requirements and certifies their eligibility to play sports as a freshman. High school student-athletes aspiring to play Division I or II athletics should register with the clearinghouse after completing their junior year.

Clearinghouse information and registration forms are available from high school guidance counselors; from the NCAA Eligibility Hotline (1-800-638-3731); or from the NCAA Clearinghouse, P. O. Box 4044, Iowa City, IA 52243-4044, telephone 319-337-1492.

The clearinghouse keeps registered student-athletes informed about the qualifications they have and have not met concerning freshmen eligibility.

Once student-athletes are enrolled in college, there are more academic standards to be met. Student-athletes must show continuing progress toward a degree each year, including a minimum number of credits passed. From the junior year on, these standards place great emphasis on progress made toward a specific degree program and ensure that student-athletes don't accumulate large numbers of credits that won't help them earn a specific degree.

The NCAA also has established various scholarship and grant programs to encourage student-athletes to pursue their undergraduate and postgraduate degrees. The Degree-Completion Grant program assists those who have exhausted their eligibility for institutional financial aid. There are also Women's and Ethnic Minority Enhancement programs and several postgraduate scholarship opportunities.

The end result? Student-athletes are now more likely than ever to enter their collegiate programs prepared and ready to succeed athletically and academically.





# CHAMPS/Life Skills

In the summer of 2000, Missouri Southern State University was named an NCAA CHAMPS/Life Skills Institution for its dedication to the development of well-rounded college student-athletes.

Under the direction of Holley Goodnight, coordinator of the Student-Athlete Success Program, Missouri Southern has made a commitment to seeing that its student-athletes reach their full potential, not just on the playing field, but also in the classroom and in the community.

## Program History

In 1991, the NCAA Foundation initiated efforts to create a total development program for student-athletes. Through the collaborative efforts of the NCAA Foundation and the Division I-A Athletic Directors' Association, the CHAMPS/Life Skills Program was created (CHAMPS is an acronym which stands for Challenging Athletes Minds for Personal Success).

In 1994, after several years of development by the NCAA Foundation, the CHAMPS/Life Skills Program was launched to the NCAA membership. That summer 46 NCAA institutions participated in the first orientation for administrators from around the country. Since that time, approximately 50 member institutions have joined the CHAMPS/Life Skills Program each year.

Today, the NCAA Education Outreach staff oversees the development of the program, offering services, support, and programs to participating institutions throughout the year. The CHAMPS/Life Skills Program is supported through the promotional and financial efforts of the NCAA Foundation, the NCAA, and the Division I-A Athletic Directors' Association.

The CHAMPS/Life Skills Program advisory team was created to help with programming initiatives and planning for the annual Orientation and Continuing Education Conference. The eight-member advisory team is made up of a diverse group of coordinators representing all NCAA divisions from different regions of the country.

## Education Outreach Mission

To provide services and support to the membership, public, and media to develop and enhance the life of the student-athlete through educational programs and resources focusing on gender equity, student-athlete welfare, and life skills.
